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Churches recognize National Donor Sabbath with Michigan Eye-Bank Donate Life Stations

ANN ARBOR – Every major religion in the United States accepts eye, organ and tissue donation as a good and charitable thing, but not everybody knows that.

“Some people are uninformed; they’re not sure how their faith feels about eye, organ and tissue donation,” says Lisa Langley, Administrative Director for the Michigan Eye-Bank

To help people better understand where their religion stands on the issue of donation, the transplant community teams up with the religious community every year for National Donor Sabbath. This year, National Donor Sabbath will be recognized **November 13-15**.

On Sunday, November 15, Michigan Eye-Bank volunteers will be setting up Donate Life Stations at several churches around the state, including Troy Faith Lutheran Church in Troy and Pilgrim Congregation United Church of Christ in Lansing. Each Station features a laptop computer with a wireless Internet card, enabling Eye-Bank representatives to sign people up on the Donor Registry via the Internet. Those who sign up will receive their red “DONOR” heart stickers from the Secretary of State in the mail in a few weeks.

To add a person’s name to the Donor Registry, all that is needed are the person’s full name, driver’s license number and birth date.

The new Michigan Eye-Bank Donate Life Stations are part of the second phase of the Eye-Bank’s ***I Joined!*** campaign, a grassroots initiative to get the word out about the importance of joining the state’s Donor Registry.
